CALL TO ORDER: A regular meeting of the Local Agency Formation Commission of Kings County was called to order by the Chairman, Joe Neves, at 3:01 p.m., on March 23, 2016 in the Board of Supervisors Chambers of the Kings County Government Center, located at 1400 W. A motion was made and seconded (Verboon/Casida) to approve the minutes of the January 27, 2016 meeting. Motion carried unanimously with Wynne abstaining.

A motion was made and seconded (Verboon/Thompson) to nominate Commissioner Wynne for vice chair and to close the nominations. Motion carried unanimously.

NEW BUSINESS

LAFCO Preliminary Budget FY 2016-2017

Mr. Gatzka presented the preliminary budget for FY 2016-2017. He reported an 11% increase in the budget from FY 2015-2016 and stated that a public hearing is scheduled for April 27, 2016 and intended to continue to May 25, 2016. Commissioner Thompson asked about the negative balance on the spreadsheet. Mr. Gatzka clarified.

Island Study Update

Mr. Kinney provided an updated county island study. Commissioner Verboon asked why area 9, El Ranch, hasn't been annexed into the city. Chairman Neves stated he is not sure how to address this since we now have mutual aid with the fire department between the county and the city. Commissioner Verboon also expressed concern that areas with residences aren't being annexed while those without residences have been annexed. Chairman Neves also asked which areas are being serviced by city services. Mr. Kinney will research and report back to the Commission.

Chairman Neves suggested focusing on areas serviced by city for water, waste water, and solid waste. Commissioner Thompson inquired about Island # 7.

A motion was made and seconded (Verboon/Casida) to continue the agenda item and invite the cities of Hanford and Corcoran to the meeting. Motion carried unanimously.

Update on Tulare LAFCO Actions pertaining to Deer Creek Storm Water District Annexation Mr. Gatzka provided an update on the Tulare LAFCO actions pertaining to Deer Creek Storm Water District annexation. He reported that Deer Creek Storm Water District had annexed 36,000 acres north of Kern county and East of Kings County and bordered by State Route 43 on the Tulare County side. The annexation is currently being contested by some of the land owners and the next meeting is scheduled for April 6, 2016. Mr. Gatzka stated they were primarily dealing with sustainable ground water issues. The Commission asked staff to attend the meeting and keep track of the progress. Mr. Kaeding also followed up on a question from the last meeting regarding LAFCOs forming JPAs among each other for the purpose of processing reorganizations. Mr. Kaeding concluded that LAFCOs can't form JPAs among each other but there is a special statute that does allow a very specific kind of agreement that LAFCOs can enter into. It was the consensus of the Commission to have a study session at a future meeting.

LEGISLATION

Mr. Gatzka informed the Commission that CALAFCO sent a letter to each LAFCO asking for letters of opposition on SB1318 and AB2032. He stated the letter wasn't received in time to write a letter of opposition, however, the larger LAFCOs are watching and responding.

Subject: 2016 Island Study update

Background

At the March 23, 2016, LAFCO meeting the commission directed staff to verify which island and substantially surrounded areas currently utilize city sewer and water services and to also invite a representative from the Cities of Corcoran and Hanford to discuss the City's plans for future annexation of those areas. Attached are updated tables and maps which depict which islands and substantially surrounded areas currently receive City sewer and water service.

In order for an area to be considered Substantially Surrounded that area must meet both of the following criteria.

- 1) Borders the annexing city on at least three contiguous sides or parts thereof; and
- 2) The length of the area's contiguous boundary with the annexing city constitutes at least 60 percent or more of the total annexation area perimeter.

Pursuant to Section 56885.5 of the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberger Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000, the LAFCO Commission may make the approval of a change of organization or reorganization conditioned upon the initiation, conduct, or completion of proceedings for another change of organization or reorganization. These powers were given by the Legislature to encourage orderly growth and development which are essential to the social, fiscal, and economic well-being of the state.

Recommend

The Executive Officer recommends that the LAFCO Commission continue to direct Staff to work with the City's of Corcoran and Hanford to encourage annexation of islands and substantially surrounded areas, and also advise them of LAFCO's authority to condition the approval of annexations contingent upon islands and substantially surrounded areas being annexed; thereby providing orderly growth and development of the cities. The LAFCO Commission may also direct staff to develop Commission policies for future City annexations of County Islands and Substantially Surrounded Areas.

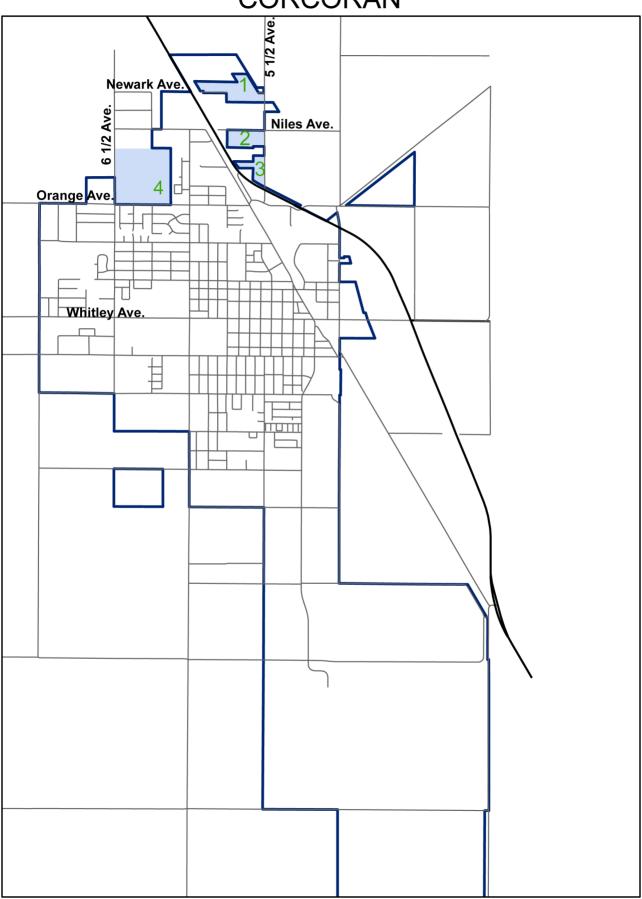

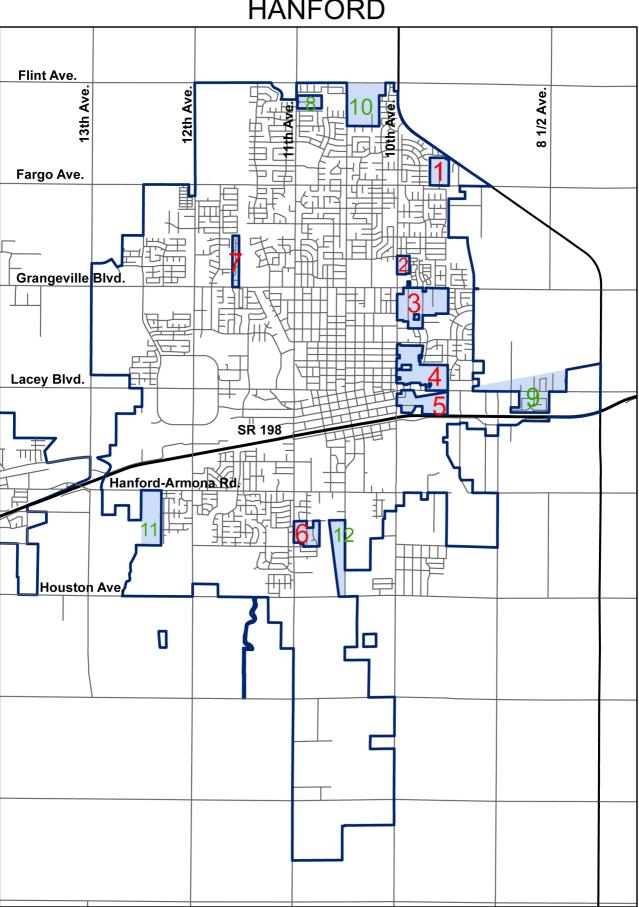

SUBJECT: 2016-2017 Proposed Budget Review

I. INTRODUCTION:

Attached is the summary review of the proposed budget recommended by the Executive Officer for Fiscal Year 2016-2017. This proposed Budget includes all the updated costs related to other County Departments. The requested budget of \$57,126 is \$5,727 more than last year's request, a 11.14% increase. The requested amount covers LAFCO's general activities as required by Assembly Bill 2838, the Cortese – Knox – Hertzberg Act, and continued involvement with CALAFCO to keep current on legislative and procedural changes. The largest adjustments in the budget this year are increases of \$1,916 in CAP Charges, \$892 from information tech services and \$2,292 in administrative allocation largely due to a projected COLA. The net result of all of the budget changes resulted in the budget with an increase of \$5,727. Revenues are projected at \$30,063, up \$2,864 from the 2015-2016 Budget. This amount includes the estimated LAFCO Application Fees of \$3,000 and City shares for half of the remaining LAFCO budget. The County covers the remaining half of the LAFCO Budget share of \$27,063, which is an increase of \$2,863 from last FY. The total budget estimate is \$57,126.

II. LAFCO 2016-2017 FISCAL YEAR OBJECTIVES

The primary objectives for the 2016-2017 Fiscal Year Budget will center on continued training for LAFCO staff on operational procedures and processes, timely processing of reorganization and sphere of influence amendment applications, processing of all spheres of influence amendments for the cities, communities, and special districts in Kings County and prepare resources for the next required update. Staff will also review and assist Cities and Districts with the preparation of detailed MSRs for any Sphere of Influence Amendment application submitted to LAFCO to ensure compliance with Government Code Section 56430. As LAFCO staff is often relied upon by Cities to advise their prospective development applicants on annexation processes, staff needs to remain current on LAFCO processes, procedures, issues and implementation strategies. Continuing Legislative changes to LAFCO processes and procedures also necessitates staff's need for continual update through CALAFCO legislative review

activities. LAFCO staff has remained actively involved with CALAFCO workshops and other training venues to fulfill that need. The two annual CALAFCO training events are organized by LAFCO volunteers to keep all LAFCOs current on issues and implementation strategies.

III. SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATION:

The recommended draft budget for FY 2016-2017 will require a budget of approximately \$57,126. After applying the estimated \$3,000 in fee revenue, the County's share is \$27,063. The Cities share is also \$27,063. An estimated summary of individual City shares based on population (not including prison populations) is provided in the chart below. The Executive Officer recommends that the Commission open the public hearing to receive public comment and testimony on the proposed LAFCO Budget and continue the public hearing to the May 25, 2016, Commission meeting. A copy of the detailed line item Budget for the proposed LAFCO Expenditures and Revenues is attached.
